Recipe 1

2 cups lemon-lime carbonated beverage
2 cups water
1/2 teaspoon household chlorine bleach

Recipe 2

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon household chlorine bleach
Mix with 1 quart water

Recipe 3

2 tablespoons white vinegar
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon household chlorine bleach
Mix with 1 quart water

Forsythia—2 weeks to bloom-Cut after January 1

Flowering Almond-3 weeks to bloom-Best cut in March

Lilac-4 weeks to bloom-Best cut in March

Pussy Willow-2 weeks to force-Cut after January 1

2014 Perennial Plant of the Year



Panicum virgatum 'Northwind' has been selected as the 2014 Perennial Plant of the Year. 'Northwind' is a tall ornamental switch grass cultivar. Olive-green to bluish-green foliage forms a compact, narrow, erect, 4-5' tall clump of foliage which is topped in late summer by finely-textured, yellow flower panicles. Panicles turn beige as the seeds mature in fall with the seed plumes persisting well into winter. Foliage turns yellow-beige in fall and provides good winter interest. This grass grows in full sun to part shade. It likes medium to wet soil so it would work well in a rain garden. It is best planted in masses or groups,

Force Branches for Winter Color

Ready for Spring? We have a few weeks to go, but you can bring a little spring inside by pruning some of your flowering shrubs and bringing the branches indoors to bloom. Choose branches with a lot of flower buds. The flower buds are larger and fatter than leaf buds. Cut the branches 6-18 inches long. When you bring the branches indoors, make a second cut on a slant just above the previous cut. If temperatures are below freezing, you will need to soak the branches full length in cool water for several hours or overnight. This keeps the buds from bursting prematurely.

Next, put the branches in a vase. Add warm water (110 degrees) no higher than 3 inches on the stems. A flower preservative will help prolong the vase life of the branches. Allow to stand for 20-30 minutes, then fill the container with additional preservative solution. Keep the container in a cool partially shaded location. Add water as needed.

When the buds show color, move the branches to a lighted room, but don't put them in direct sunlight.

These branches may root during the forcing period. To start a new plant, remove the branch from the water when the roots are 1/4-3/8 inches long. All branches should be trimmed to a length of approximately 6-8 inches. Then put in a pot and keep moist until permanent roots are formed. The new plant can be planted outdoors when warm weather arrives.

'Green Ball' Dianthus—Great flower for arrangements

Scientific Name : *Dianthus barbatus*
Hardiness Degree : 10°F (-12.2°C)
Blooming Season : Late Spring, Summer

Height : 10 - 14" (25 - 36cm)

Penstemon 'Arabesque™ Red'

Another AAS Winner for the pollinator garden that the hummingbirds will love! Plus, the first ever penstemon to become an AAS Winner in more than eighty years of trialing. This beauty is a season-long repeat bloomer with large tubular blooms almost one inch across on strong vigorous stems. 'Arabesque Red' is best started indoors then transplanted for a longer bloom time. Great for combination containers and can be used as an annual or as a perennial for gardens in zones 6-9.

Plant Penstemon 'Arabesque Red' F1 in a full sun location with well drained soil. Water once weekly or as needed. Fertilize with either a controlled timed release or a general purpose liquid fertilizer monthly through the growing season. Remove dead flowers to encourage continuous blooming.

Bean Mascotte 2014 AAS Vegetable Award Winner

The first AAS winning bean since 1991, this compact variety is perfect for today's small-space gardens. Mascotte is a bush type bean that produces long, slender pods that stay above the foliage for easy harvest. This bean also has white showy flowers for ornamental value during bloom time. Judges appreciated the crunchiness and taste of this bean as well as the plentiful harvest all season long. The Mascotte root system is ideal for patio containers and window boxes, and this versatile variety performs well in garden beds too. That means you can raise delicious beans in any outside space.

How to Grow

Sow 4 x 3-4 seeds per window box, first sowing mid-May when the soil is warm enough, then every 2 weeks until July. In the garden, sow seeds every 2-3" in rows 12" apart.
