The Columbia Garden Club held its annual member's garden tours on June 12, 2023 starting at 8:30 a.m. Small groups toured the gardens of Betty Connelly, Julie Deering, and Patty O'Neal. Then everyone toured the garden of Donna Russell together. We all then went to the garden of Ann O'Dell for our picnic lunches and club meeting.

Betty Connelly called the **business meeting** to order at 1 p.m. with 24 members and one guest, Jane Jacobs who joined CGC. Betty thanked all the home owners for showing their gardens, and thanked Donna Russell for preparing the Garden Tours booklet.

Mary Nesladek gave the **inspiration:** "Gardening is the art that uses flowers and plants as paint, and the soil and sky as canvas" by Elizabeth Murray.

June birthdays were recognized: Gayle Fry and Elaine Keely.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as distributed.

CGC received an award of \$50 for our programming from Mae J. Nothstine.

We received a thank you note from Sheri Menscher who was a judge at the May flower show.

Who commented that everyone was very welcoming and the show was great.

The **treasurer's report** shows a balance of \$14,637.51.

Lynn Birkby (who was not at the meeting) made a suggestion to Betty to consider a donation to the Columbia Center for Urban Agriculture. Linda Antal moved to donate \$600 to CCUA; Rebecca Smith seconded. The motion passed. A check will be sent to them. Of note, we will be holding our October meeting at their facility.

Committee Reports:

- -Ann O'Dell reported that the June Yard of the Month goes to Cale Mitchell at 1900 Parkade Blvd (corner of Parkade and Leslie).
- -Rita Gerke reported that the recipient of the \$1,000 CGC scholarship is Khader Saleh who will be a junior at MU this fall and plans to graduate in the Fall of 2025 with a Bachelor's Degree in Plant Science and a Bachelors in Environmental Science.
- -Marie Pasley said we will resume volunteering at the Food Bank on Vandiver every fourth Thursday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. starting in June.
- -Marie also reported that we will make mini flower bouquets for Meals on Wheels recipients at our regular August meeting. She reminded members to try and grow small flowers suitable for these bouquets.

New Business: Betty appointed Mary Nesladek to chair the nominating committee for officers for 2024–2025. Marie Pasley and Patty O'Neal volunteered to also be on the committee. Marie Pasley moved that the nominations be submitted for voting at the August meeting instead of the September meeting as stated in the CGC By-Laws; Leigh Speichinger seconded. Motion passed. Elaine Keely and Melissa Kouba brought up ideas of a "Greener" Flower Show, especially in not using oasis (which is a petroleum product and not good for the environment). We should use more sustainable products. We hope to form a committee in July to look into this further. CoMo Wild Yards Program with the City of Columbia has someone who will come to see your yard to give ideas for your garden. Elaine Keely talked about various web sites to help identify wildflowers and seedlings.

The Columbia Garden Club June Yard of the Month is located at 1900 Parkade Blvd, where Cale Mitchell, his partner and two sons have ived for twenty years. When they bought it, the yard was in terrible condition, so after cutting down five trees and completely re-landscaping the yard, they have created a beautiful space for rest and relaxation.

Although the resting and relaxing comes after weeding, mulching, planting 150 bulbs and adding to the hosta collection. They grow several plants from seed, and find new plants to grow every year.

Cale says that they have learned to plant so that they don't have to fight wildlife and pests. They are cutting down on spraying by using scent boxes to discourage animals, and they try to keep plants healthy because that helps keep animals from eating them.


Cale is the grandson and son of avid gardeners. He himself won a blue ribbon at the St. Louis Garden Club flower show when he entered a flowering cactus at age four. His mother is an expert hosta gardener and shares her extensive collection hostas with him. His grandmother was involved in the project of planting the Climatron at Shaw's Garden in St.Louis.




