May CGC meeting

The Columbia Garden Club met at 1 p.m. on May 8, 2023. The guest speaker was Alice Longfellow who founded Longfellow's Garden Center in Centertown, MO (but has since sold that business). Her presentation was titled **"The Gardens and the Isle of Skye."** The slideshow had beautiful pictures of a tour she hosted to Scotland a few years ago. We saw photos of: alpine plants, lavender, English gardens with living walls, explorer's garden—plants from various places around the world, purple roses, roof-top gardens, native plants, tree ferns, hydrangeas, prairie garden, hanging baskets, and many more beautiful plants and flowers. Alice also had pictures of castles and a memorial of WW I with a 100 year anniversary.

After refreshments, Betty Connelly called the meeting to order at 2:04 p.m. with 27 members attending and four guests.

Mary Nesladek gave the **inspiration**: "The glory of gardening: hands in the dirt, head in the sun, heart with nature. To nurture a garden is to feed not just the body, but the soul" by Alfred Austin.

May birthdays were recognized: Karen Blackmore, Diana Cooksey, Linda O'Keefe, and Hugh Harrison.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as distributed.

Treasurer Carolyn Oates reported that the April plant sale made a profit of \$2,557.25 which included \$125.25 from the bake sale. The balance in the checking account is \$12,043.83 as of 4/30/23. The proceeds from the plant sale had not been deposited at that time. Mary Nesladek reported that the tulip poplar tree in memory of Amanda Schoenfeld has been planted at Bethel Park on the north side of the J. W. Ficklin shelter. The plaque will be installed later.

Karen Blackmore reported on her attendance at the **National Garden Clubs Convention**; she said it was really fun.

CGC got some awards at the **State Convention.** CGC met all of the criteria for a Purple Ribbon Rating. We also won the Betty Hardin Standard Flower Show Award for Nature's Splendor which was sent on to NGC and won a Club Standard Flower Show Award. Central District got a third-place award for the Educational Exhibit and this will be on exhibit at the State Fair in August. At the State Convention CGC brought home the Mae Jean Nothstine Award for innovative programs.

Donna Russell will prepare a booklet for the tour. One day about eight years ago Nancy West's husband, Craig, stood at the window with Nancy looking at the grass covered front lawn at 504 Thilly. He said, "I hate mowing the grass. Let's rip it up!" And they did. Ever since, they've been gardening enthusiastically in the front yard, around the side of the house and into the large back yard.

Nancy's design goal is to create an opulent garden, a lavish but well-planned display of flowers, shrubs and trees. She often moves plants from one location to another and regularly adds plants, so her garden is constantly under development. She likes to mix and match colors and textures when building her original and personal garden design.

Nancy finds special pleasure in gardening, enjoying fresh air and working with soil and plants, because it contrasts with her job indoors at MU, working as an English professor. Because the yard is so big and grass still covers much of the back yard, she is looking forward to many years of enjoying her passion. Craig has become involved in the opulent garden project, building stone walls, mulching, and helping

to find plants that they simply have to have.


Nancy attributes her gardening successes to being willing to make mistakes, willing to fix mistakes, reading gardening books, and paying increasingly more attention to the science involved in keeping a thriving garden. She said that her mother was an instinctive gardener and just seemed to know what to do at the right time, but Nancy feels that she puts a lot of research into her gardening efforts. She and her husband also watch the BBC program, "Gardener's World", which she finds inspiring and educational. She recommends that every gardener watch at least a few episodes of this program.

One important note: Nancy talks to her plants and names them. She admits to treating them like people, which could very well be one of her secrets to growing happy plants. But that is just one component of effective gardening, and Nancy and Craig's beautiful garden shows that planning, attention, and a passion for gardening can create beauty for everyone to enjoy.
